Official Order of Service

Sunday 13 November 2022 at 10.55am
Corporation Street, Derby



Thank you for joining us for Derby's annual Service of Remembrance and Parade.

The Service of Remembrance will take place across two sites – on Corporation Street and the Market Place, beginning at 10:55am. Members of the public are invited to view the proceedings from designated areas in these two locations, where there will also be large screens showing the event.

Those wishing to see the start of the Parade and Service in person are advised to go to the viewing areas on Corporation Street. Alternatively, those wishing to view the wreath laying at the War Memorial in person should go straight to the Market Place.

Once the service has finished and the Parade continues, crowd barriers will be moved so that members of the public can walk from Corporation Street to the Market Place, although space may be limited and an unobstructed view cannot be guaranteed.

Those of a nervous disposition should be made aware that the beginning of the two-minute silence will be signalled by the firing of a Maroon. Maroons are explosive devices, similar to fireworks, which create a loud bang.

The Service of Remembrance

Gathering

All gather in silence. Parade march on.

The Very Revd, Dr Peter Robinson, Dean of Derby says:

We meet in the presence of God. We commit ourselves to work in penitence and faith for reconciliation between the nations, that all people may, together, live in freedom, justice and peace.

We pray for all who in bereavement, disability and pain continue to suffer the consequences of fighting and terror. We remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away.

Remembering

The Exhortation is read:

*They shall grow not old,
as we that are left grow old;
age shall not weary them,
nor the years condemn.*

*At the going down of the sun
and in the morning,
we will remember them.*

All: We will remember them.

The Last Post, two minutes Silence, Reveille – Standards dip.

The Kohima Epitaph is read:

When you go home tell them of us and say: for your tomorrow, we gave our today.

The Dean of Derby says:

Ever-living God, we remember those whom you have gathered from the storm of war into the peace of your presence; may that same peace calm our fears, bring justice to all peoples and establish harmony among the nations, through Jesus Christ our Lord.
